


Define your actual challenges

In many companies, getting everyone on the same page is often one of the biggest challenges. Oftentimes employees don't comply with the organization's policies because they are simply unaware of them. Have you set up processes to communicate, train and socialize information-related policies? 
02 Identify the stakeholders

There's no single department in charge of developing and maintaining an InfoGov program. A comprehensive program brings key stakeholders together to solve information related problems. Who are these people in your organization? Which departments do they represent?

This team should have a proper mix of legal, compliance, HR, IT, and key business stakeholders. So much can be solved with the right individuals sitting around the same table.

Consider your resources (budget, people, technology)

There are always InfoGov initiatives that require little to no budget. Proper guidance can help build an ongoing budget — and find the balance between budget and people-powered tasks.

A barrier that frequently comes up is what we call "the technology conundrum". Many organizations will have a knee-jerk reaction and reach for technological solutions to solve all their problems, but an InfoGov program shouldn't mean revamping your IT world. Oftentimes, existing tools and technology are sufficient. A good InfoGov program will build the right pieces around to use everything more effectively and achieve the desired results.





In truth, the best time to advance (or start) your Information Governance program is now.
